OR

(d) Comment on the role of the chorus in *Oedipus Rex*.

(e) Examine *Medea* as a play of ideas.

OR

(f) Analyze the character of Jason in *Medea*.

(g) Comment on the chorus in *The Birds*.

OR

(h) Critically comment on elements of satire in *The Birds*.
