B.A HONOURS IN ENGLISH UNDER C.B.C.S

CORE COURSE:

1. English Language: Overview & Usage; Literary Types

The paper disseminates comprehensive knowledge on the growth and evolution of the English Language. A study of the common types and acquaintance with the English rhetoric and prosody farther extend the appreciative faculty of the students pursuing Honours Course in English.

2. European Classical Literature

Special insight on the antiquarian European legacy of the English literary art is achieved through specific studies of ancient Greek dramatic texts.

3. Indian Classical Literature & Indian Writing in English

Awareness towards the problems of interpreting Indian Culture via the English Language and acquaintance with the work of significant Indian writers of poetry, prose fictions and drama is pursued in this Course.

4. British Literature: Old English Period to 14th Century

Enabling students to understand and appreciate the cultural range, historical significance and applicable scope of English Literature.

5. American Literature

Literature produced in English language in the Indian post-colony is a vital part of critical literary understanding in this discipline. Awareness towards the problems of interpreting Indian Culture via the English Language and acquaintance with the work of significant Indian writers of poetry, prose fictions and drama is pursued in this Course.

6. British Poetry & Drama: 14th to 17th Centuries

Through the study of some specific literary texts, e.g. Shakespearean sonnets, Metaphysical Poems, plays of masters like Shakespeare, Marlowe and Kyd, empowerment of the students to examine on their own the themes and structures of Elizabethan drama, the upsurge of Humanism and the poetic sensibility of Western metaphysical creativity of the Caroline age is systematically targeted.

7. British Poetry & Drama: 17th and 18th Centuries

A thoroughbred understanding of the literary and cultural implications of the Restoration of the Stuart line of monarchy on the English throne and the eventual maturation of the great 18th c. Neo-Classical mindset is studied through a selection of mock-heroic satires, epic poems, anti-sentimental comedies and novels.

8. British Literature: 18th Century

This paper enhances the scope and purpose of the previous one as the 18th century British literature is uniquely important in understanding the basic mode of cultural production of the upcoming centuries in England and the Continent as well.

9. British Romantic Literature

By dint of some specific literary texts, long poems, ballads, odes and novels of writers ranging from the era of the Precursors of Romanticism to the middle of the 19th c. a holistic development of the understanding of one of the most remarkable phases of the English Literature, i.e. Romantic Poetry & Prose, is ardently sought after.

10. British Literature: 19th Century

Facilitating students' acquaintance with poems, fictions and non-fictions produced within the span of Victorian period from the mid-nineteenth century to the beginning of the 20^{th} c.

11. Women's Writing

This paper facilitates critical consciousness of gender-politics, its questions and feminist perceptions regarding women as well as human empowerment through the study of feminism, feminist writings and feminism's history.

12. British Literature: The Early 20th Century

Modern novels, poems, short stories and plays along with conclusive discussions on the events of the World Wars and the idea of Modernism, its cult and crisis as well, are graphically approached and appreciated through the study of this particular paper.

13. Modern European Drama

Showcases the socio-economic and historical symptoms, loose-ends, mores of anxiety and resolution of the modernist existence erupting through the membrane of their dramatic productions.

14. Postcolonial Literatures

A brief but effective tour of Postcolonial literary production, its unique features and ground reality, is provided to the students through acquaintances and appreciation of texts selected from Indian English Literature, African English Literature, Caribbean and American Literature. Mastering an all-round conception of the variety of English Literatures, produced on a broad scale in different English languages, is the outcome of this particular course.

AECC2: COMPULSORY ENGLISH

This paper is compulsory for all students of the Core and the Programme Courses. General writing and comprehension skill of the students and their elementary proficiency in English is nurtured by the study of this paper.

Major Course 1: English Language and Usage: This course is designed to familiarize the learners with the basic ideas, concepts, theories and issues in Rhetoric and Prosody and Elementary Linguistics. This course aims to introduce learners to the key aspects of the major literary types in Literature. After completion, a learner is expected to: Acquire domain knowledge on the discipline.

Develop a general understanding of English Language and Literature as a distinct subject of study and its inter-disciplinary character as well.

Major Course 2: Classical Literature in Translation: This course intends to introduce the learners to the most important texts of Classical Greek and Roman drama in translation.

The objective of this course is to familiarize the learners with the concepts of tragedy and comedy. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Be acquainted with the most basic concepts of Classical European literature and the distinctive features of tragedy and comedy.

Major Course 3: Indian Classical Literature in Translation: This course is designed to familiarize the learners with the basic ideas, concepts, theories and issues in Indian Classical Literature in Translation. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Acquire domain knowledge about the discipline.

Develop a general understanding of Indian Classical Literature in Translation as a distinct subject of study and its inter-disciplinary character as well.

Major Course 4: From the Beginning to the 16th Century: This course is designed to familiarize the learners with the basic ideas, concepts, theories and issues in British Literature from the beginning to the Renaissance. After completion, a learner is expected to: Acquire domain knowledge about the discipline and form an idea about the basics of British Literature.

Major Course 5: Elizabethan and Jacobean Poetry: This course is designed to introduce the learners to British post-Renaissance poetry. After completion, a learner is expected to: Develop a general understanding of Elizabethan and Jacobean poetry.

Major Course 6: Elizabethan Drama and Shakespeare: This course aims to orient the young learners towards the development of British drama with emphasis on

Elizabethan drama. It also introduces the learners to the early comic and tragic dramatists and the works of Shakespeare. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Form a brief overview of the Elizabethan dramatists and have an insight into the tragic and comic worlds of William Shakespeare.

Major Course 7: 17th and 18th Century Literature-I: This course is designed to familiarize the learners with the basic ideas, concepts, theories and issues in 17th century British Literature. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Develop a general understanding of 17th century British Literature as a distinct subject of study, and develop a comprehensive idea about the epic and the mock-epic and the Restoration dramatic conventions.

Major Course 8: 17th and 18th Century Literature-II: This course is designed to familiarize the learners with the basic ideas, concepts, and theories of the Enlightenment, Neo-classical literature, the periodicals of the 18th century and the rise of the English novel. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Develop a comprehensive idea about Neo-classical literature and the origins of the English novel.

Minor Course 1: This course aims to impart knowledge about the fundamentals of English Poetry.

This course is designed to familiarize the learners with the basic ideas, concepts, approaches, theories and issues in interpreting poetry. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Acquire domain knowledge on the discipline.

Develop a general understanding of English Poetry as a distinct subject of study.

Minor Course 2: Understanding Poetry: This course aims to impart knowledge about the fundamentals of English Drama.

This course is designed to familiarize the learners with the basic ideas, concepts, approaches, theories and issues in interpreting drama. After completion, a learner is expected to: Acquire domain knowledge on the discipline.

Develop a general understanding of English Drama as a distinct subject of study.

SEC 1: To equip the learners with a basic concept of how to comprehend a passage/poem and answer questions based on them. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Develop a basic understanding of literary analysis and write the summary of a prosepiece and the substance of a poem.

SEC 2: To equip the learners with the basic concepts of writing skills and editing. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Develop a basic understanding of how to write a report, an advertisement and a curriculumvitae.

SEC 2: English for Expression: To equip the learners with a basic concept of how to improve their writing skills. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Develop a basic understanding of writing film or literary reviews and writing descriptive or argumentative articles.

MDC 1: Introduction to African Literature: This course aims to introduce the students to the basic concepts and the important texts from African Literature. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Understand the basic concepts of African Literature and Culture

MDC 2: This course intends to introduce the learners to the works of William Shakespeare and Rabindranath Tagore, the literary doyens of England and India. After completion, a learner is expected to:

Develop a basic understanding of the ideas, concepts of the dramas and sonnets of Shakespeare and the short stories and lyrics of Tagore.

MDC 3: **Graphic Novels:** This course intends to develop among the learners a basic understanding of the ideas and concepts of Graphic Novels. After completion, a learner is expected to:

MDC 4: Literature of Eastern Himalayas: This course intends to develop among the learners a basic understanding of the much varied literature and culture of the Eastern Himalayas. After completion, a learner is expected to:
